### Business and Labor 2019 Review




- Total covered employment was at 126,735
  - (an increase of 1.8% OTY)
- Total covered payrolls were at \$6.8 bill
  - (an increase of 5.7% OTY)
- Total covered firms were at <u>8,545</u>
  - (an increase of 4.3% OTY)

- Total active Civilian Labor Force (CLF) was at 146,283
  - (an increase of 4.0% OTY)
- Total CLF employment was at <u>138,142</u>
  - (an increase of 4.1% OTY)
- Total CLF unemployment was at 8,141
  - (an increase of 2.7% OTY)
- Total nonemployer firms at 12,500 in 2018
- Total nonemployer firm revenue at \$573.4 mill


#### Total payroll employment share by industry, percent 2019




- Labor force participation rate at 64.1% in 2019 (Benton at 62.2%, Franklin at 66.0% 3<sup>rd</sup> in the state after King and Snohomish)
- Over 81.3% of labor force is between 25 and 64 years of age
- Over 31.1% of labor force is Hispanic or Latino, 61.7% is white alone, not Hispanic or Latino, and 7.2% all other race
- Over 44.5% of labor force are female workers and of those 41.8% have children under 6 years of age. Franklin county female LF
   participate at 59.7% vs. Benton county participation of 56.2%


### Labor force by industry











### Resident unemployment statistics: Ul Rate






# Resident labor force initial claims by industry-Benton-Franklin MSA





# Resident labor force initial claims by occupational group Benton and Franklin MSA



# Most impacted nonfarm industries in Kennewick-Pasco-Richland MSA (Benton and Franklin Counties)




■ Total are nonfarm employment loss at 8.8% (10,400) in April (from March of 117,800 to 107,400 in April)

Largest contributors to the total loss were:

- Leisure and hospitality 40.4% or 4,200 jobs
- Private Educational and Healthcare Services 10.6% or 1,100 jobs
- Retail trade 14.4% or 1,500 jobs
- Construction 9.6% or 1,000 jobs

### Nonfarm industry total change (May, Jun., Jul., Aug., Sep.) Kennewick-Pasco-Richland MSA (Benton and Franklin Counties)



- Total are nonfarm employment gained 81.7% (8,500) jobs compared to April loss of 10,400
- In December, employment stood at 115,900, only 2.5% less than in 2019


### Most impacted industry recovery

- Leisure and hospitality 26.2% or 1,100 jobs of 4,200 lost in April
- Private Educational and Healthcare Services 100.0% or 1,100 jobs and added 200 more
- Retail trade recovered all 1,500 lost jobs and added 1,100 more to its payrolls
- Construction recovery is at 100%
  - Government is the only industry with additional loss from May through December with no positive job recover (-18.2%)





#### Percent of April's job loss recovery from May through December 2020




### Wages and Income



- Franklin County average annual wage was at \$43,996 in 2019, below that of Benton County of \$57,182 and the state at 69,615 or \$52,669 (Less King)
- Franklin County per capita personal income was at \$39,526 in 2019, below that of Benton County of \$49,354 and the state of \$64,758
- Franklin County median household income was at \$62,002 in 2019, less than Benton County of \$72,084 and the state of \$85,169


### Real estate-All transactions housing index






### Change in Consumer Spending by Categoryfrom Opportunity Insights (Chetty et.,)
